### Tips, Tricks and Techniques

(New Feature Continued from March Issue)

- Prune your shrubs and suckers from trees in the winter and save those prunings for staking plants next summer....or make an obelisk. Another way to support those floppy plants is to set up a support structure. Place strong upright plants in front of tall, floppy ones to eliminate the need for staking. Plant Salvia or Veronica in front of Shasta Daisies or Cosmos, for example.
- Use dormant oil spray to avoid more bug and disease problems in the spring and summer.
- ♦ Rodent and deer protection is a must to protect shrubs, evergreens, and trees. Other winter protection from the elements is equally important. Be sure your plants are not positioned so that they get salt thrown on them by snow removal. Wrap trunks with tree wrap.

### **Sticky Bees**

In a recent discovery, scientists found bumblebees use electrical signals to determine which flowers have more nectar, allowing them to forage for pollen more efficiently. Bees build up positive electrical charges as they fly, which helps the pollen stick to them as they land on the flowers. Scientists found that this electrical charge is transferred to the flowers when bees land to feed. Subsequent they pick up on this electrical charge, telling the bee which flowers have already been foraged so they don't waste their energy Phlox paniculata 'Purple Eyes' with bees where little pollen will likely



remain. The use of electrical signals had previously been documented in sharks, but not in insects. This fascinating research was first published in the February 21, 2013 issue of Nature magazine.

# July Garden Guide

- Water gladiolus and dahlias weekly to a depth of 6-8 inches.
- Water flower beds at least once a week during dry spells. Remove old lily blooms.
- Peony bushes should be mulched and seedpods removed.
- Take cuttings from roses and spring flowering shrubs for new plant propagation when stems are no longer succulent but not yet hardened.
- Cut old canes of climbing roses so those new shoots can grow.
- Control rust on hollyhock by removing infected leaves.
- Divide iris and day lily when done blooming. Cut leaves back to about 8 inches.
- Thin and transplant perennials sown in June.
- Complete outdoor sowing of perennial seed.
- Inspect vegetables and herbs for pests daily and treat if necessary.
- Control garden weeds to prevent them from going to seed.
- Harvest onions and early potatoes when tops begin to shrivel.
- In early July, plant lettuce and spinach for fall crop. Pre-germinate on moist towel or plant deeper than in spring
- Plant kale, bunching onions, cucumbers, beets, rutabagas and turnips, cabbage family seedlings and peas for fall harvest.
- Keep tomatoes mulched and watered to prevent blossom end rot.
- Keep ripe vegetables picked to maintain productivity.
- Watch for spider mites during hot, dry weather. Juniper and spruce needles turn rusty colored if infested.
- Water newly planted trees weekly if needed throughout the summer and apply a mulch (three inches or less) to maintain even soil moisture.
- During dry spells, water all trees deeply every 2-3 weeks.
- Remove suckers from grafted plants. Water fruit trees during dry spells or they may abort fruit. Trees need one inch of water weekly during fruit growth.
- Prune yews, junipers and arborvitae by mid-July.
- Remove old canes of summer bearing red raspberries after harvest. Thin new canes to 3-4 canes per foot of row or 9-10 canes per hill. For black raspberries, thin new canes to 10 per hill. Cut tips of new canes back around July 1. Cut back raspberry tips back to two feet above the soil level and blackberry tips back to four feet above soil level. Cut purple and yellow raspberry tips to 30-36 inches above the soil.
- Keep orchard grass mowed and raked to discourage fungal pathogens harbored in tall grass and plant debris.
  Hang baited red sticky ball traps in apple trees for apple maggot control.

A trip to Southeast Wisconsin: Mitchell Park Horticultural Conservancy (The Domes) in Milwaukee; and Boerner Botanical Gardens in Hales Corners.

Saturday, July 19, 2014; depart Lamers Bus Lines, 2611 West Grand Ave., Wis. Rapids – at 7:00 a.m.

Cost: \$50.00 (Includes bus fare, guided tour fees at both gardens; tips, and snacks/beverages.)

This year we will spend a day in southeastern Wisconsin. We will stop at two sites: <u>Mitchell Park Horticultural Conservancy (The Domes)</u>. The conservancy has been part of the Milwaukee scene since 1898. The origi-

nal greenhouses were replaced starting in 1959. Three beehive-shaped glass domes, 140 feet in diameter at the base and 85 feet high, offer 15,000 sq. ft. of plant display. The <u>Desert Dome</u> houses one the worlds' finest collections of cacti, succulents, shrubs and arid-land bulbs. An Oasis of Pampas Grass and desert palms beckons as paths lead you past many plant oddities with intriguing geometric forms, subtle coloration and unique adaptations to hot, dry habitats. The <u>Tropical Dome</u> displays a rich diversity of plants from the rainforests of five continents. Showy flowers, fruits, nuts, spices and a multitude of orchids and bromeliads surround you as you're drawn toward a rushing waterfall in this paradise. Be sure to look for the colorful birds that call the Tropical dome their home. The <u>Floral Show Dome</u> is a seasonal display to delight you with their beauty and will serve to inspire your gardens. The theme for the summer will be "Plant-tastic Voyage Summer Floral Show."

Boerner Botanical Gardens. These gardens are located in Hales Corners (just 20 minutes from The Domes) and within Whitnall Park. The gardens are named for Alfred Boerner, who designed the original five formal gardens in the 1930's. This peaceful location offers more than 40 acres of formal gardens in the style typical of the English country manor, featuring glacial fieldstone walls and historic, handcrafted limestone statuary. Garden offerings include an annual garden, shrub mall, rock garden, daylily path, bog garden walk, heirloom garden, herb garden, perennial garden, rose garden and peony garden. The property also features a garden house, visitor center and a restored CCC encampment building, as well as original stone and wood carvings created by WPA artists. We will see visual links to the surrounding 1,000 acre arboretum, which houses the largest crab apple collection in Wisconsin. The gardens include test and display garden for All-America Selections, and is an American Hosta Society Display Garden. After our guided tour, there will be time to study the test gardens and wander a bit more. Because of the length of this trip, there will not be a nursery stop as in previous trips.
