During the 1970s, horticultural assistance by CES was further expanded with the formation of the Master Gardener programs in each state. The program was designed to 'recruit and train volunteers to serve the public' in the field of horticulture. The program is active in all 50 states, the District of Columbia and two provinces in Canada. It's been estimated that there are currently approximately 95,000 active volunteers who contribute more than five million volunteer hours per year.

The article went on to interview several Cooperative Extension Service agents around the country. Each expressed his gratitude for the program and the enthusiasm of the volunteers. Just think how many more people Extension is able to reach with us helping to carry the message. Being part of the CES network is important - to us, to Extension and to our community. Be proud to be a part!

Seed Savers Lending Library Project

The Lester Public Library of Vesper is embarking on an ambitious new project to promote gardening, use of the local library and the community involvement of our UW Extension Wood County Master Gardener Volunteer organization.

The basic idea is this: you check out a packet of seeds, plant them, and let some of them grow to maturity. You harvest those next generation seeds, and return them to the library so other people can check them out. Community members may 'borrow' these seeds for free from the library.

Borrowers can use a **check out seeds card**, and access free classes on organic gardening and how to save seeds at the end of the growing season. They also have easy access to books and other gardening resources from the Vesper library.

Dr. Chris Williamson reminds us that more needs to be ½ tsp. Cinnamon learned before we panic unnecessarily. It still hasn't been ½ tsp. Ginger demonstrated that EAB can complete its life cycle in fringetree, merely one larva was found in each of the four white 1 cup broken walnuts or pecans fringetrees that EAB was found.

Additionally, the drought of 2012 put trees under stress, which made them temporarily measurably more susceptible to an EAB infestation.

Before Master Gardener Volunteers begin to offer up a social network meme as gardening advice, please note our specialist at our university or another needs to do more research and vet the information before it should be an official response to concerned homeowners.

Goodies From the Garden

Cranberry Chutney

1 lb. (5 cups) fresh cranberries

¹/₄ tsp. Allspice

Directions:

Drain pineapple, reserving juice. Combine pineapple juice, sugar, cranberries, raisins and spices. Cook to boiling then reduce heat and simmer for 25 minutes. Add pineapple and nuts. Should be used within six months if not refrigerated (would have to be processed in hot water bath to seal). Must be refrigerated once opened. I have a 2nd refrigerator so I just keep it refrigerated in glass mason jars.

Cranberry Nut Pie

1/4 Cup firmly packed brown sugar

1/4 Cup Chopped Walnuts

1 Egg

½ Cup granulated sugar

½ Cup sifted all-purpose flour

1/3 Cup butter or margarine

Directions:

Spread cranberries on bottom of unbaked 9-inch piecrust. Sprinkle with brown sugar and nuts (I combine nuts, brown sugar and cranberries in a baggie and shake well to combine ingredients before pouring into pie shell). Beat egg, gradually adding granulated sugar until thick and thoroughly blended. Add flour and melted butter; beat well. Pour batter over cranberries mixture. Bake at 325 degrees for 45 minutes. Cool on rack. Serving suggestion: serve warm with vanilla ice cream.
