Cold Snap Aquaponics provides locally grown produce and fish to Central Wisconsin year round. All products are free of herbicides, fertilizers, and chemicals.

Aquaponics is an integrated scientific model of agriculture in which fish and plants are raised in a system that benefits both.

This relatively new agriscience is sustainable and biologically sound. It's also good for the environment. Aquaponics uses less than 10% of the water needed for conventional agriculture.

- For the owls: bottle caps for the eyes.

March Garden Guide

from Portage County Master Gardeners Volunteers

- Plant tuberous rooted begonias indoors early in the month.
- Begin regular fertilization of houseplants.
- March is a good month to make cuttings of many houseplants.
- Order perennial plants and specify that they be delivered when the ground is workable.
- Start seeds of slow-growing annuals. Transfer them as appropriate in April to cold frame.
- Start bulbs of calla. They will bloom from June to August.
- Start seedlings of cabbage, celery, cauliflower, head lettuce, and parsley.
- Keep amaryllis foliage growing by watering and feeding.
- Continue to inspect stored vegetables. Anything showing signs of spoilage should be removed immediately and either used or discarded.
- Don't worry if spring-flowering bulbs are sending up green leaves. The foliage can withstand winter weather.
- March is the leanest month for wildlife, so protect shrubs and plants with wire cages or sprinkle ground with cat hair or blood meal.
- Do not remove mulch from perennials too early. Keep light covering of mulch over spring bulbs.
- Rake off last season's mulches on garden soil so it can dry and be warmed by the sun. Remove any plant residue left from last year.
- If the compost pile froze during winter, turn it now, and add fresh manure to help restart the composting process.
- Finish pruning dormant trees.
- Sharpen lawn mower blades and have mower serviced before spring rush.
- If you fertilize, apply to shade trees, fruit trees and shrubs when buds swell, as well as to evergreens and raspberries.
- Prune summer flowering (after end of June) shrubs.
- Finish pruning grapes. Nondormant pruning will cause excessive bleeding.
- Finish dormant pruning of fruit trees and berry bushes. Remove diseased or infected branches.



How are trees related to the human family? How are tree behaviors related to other trees in the forests? What role does the tree root fungiplay with the relationships with our soil organisms?

The compassionate author presents an ecological approach with light scientific explanations of the ecology movement. He has managed many large forests in Europe being a well known arborist and horticulturist.

What can we do to promote the growth of trees and woods lasting hundreds of years? How does fungi provide minerals for sugar changes? Wohlleben explains the process of life, death, and regeneration, as he studied forty years being a graduate of forestry school.

I enjoyed reading this popular New York Times best seller and appreciated his expertise from a nurturing horticulture standpoint. The chapters are 3-6 pages in length, allowing the busy reader to place the book down and pick up the text later.
