ColdSnap Aquaponics with Pam Walker April 24, 7:00 p.m. 6251 State Hwy 54 West, WR

In 2017, Pamela and her family constructed the ColdSnap Aquaponics facility 10 miles west of Wisconsin Rapids, located in Central Wisconsin. The greenhouse provides a state-of-the-art, clean and controlled environment supporting the standard operating procedures and good agricultural practices measured against aquaponics industry standards for bio-security and food safety.

On seed tables grow varieties of Romaine, Bibb and Buttercrisp lettuce, spinach, plus microgreens and fancy leaf lettuce. Four media beds provide the space to grow tomatoes, cucumbers, kohlrabi, beets, and other vegetables suitable for shallow root development.

With the capacity to grow 90,000 heads of lettuce annually, ColdSnap Aquaponics provides fresh produce to local schools, hospitals, restaurants, and grocery stores. Produce also will be available on a small scale to retail customers who visit the ColdSnap greenhouse. Lettuce will be cut for those interested in purchasing it at the meeting for \$3.00 a head. 





Increased Emphasis on Education Encouraged in MGV Programs

Over the past few years the BOD has been trying to increase the ways we can provide more education and less grunt work in our projects. We began circulating a list last fall for people to indicate what horticultural topics they were familiar with, such as natives, vegetable growing, roses, orchids, bee keeping, etc. The purpose of this list is twofold.

First, if we have a question from the public, such as at an Ask a Master Gardener session, or just a neighbor who has a problem with a particular plant, for example, we would have a list of members who may be able to help solve the problem. Second, if we get a request for a speaker/program on a particular topic, we would know who we might call on for information or to be a possible speaker.

Now, I can hear you saying, "Whoa!! But I'm not an expert on that". True, you may not consider yourself an "expert" but you probably know more about the topic than you realize. You don't have to be an expert to be a speaker or present a program. We are encouraging our members to think about the possibility. You would not be alone in this. There is a group of people that would help you develop your program, such as producing a PowerPoint or handouts, practice your program, and even go with you to co-present or for moral support!! Being a speaker or giving a program is really a grown-up version of show and tell. You are showing and telling what you know about a topic familiar to you. We are also trying to figure out a way to archive or store the materials and information a member develops for a program, so that in the future if we get a request for the same or a similar program, there will be a program or materials already prepared.

We will be talking more about this initiative at the May meeting. In the meantime, if you have questions talk to one of the Community Education and Outreach Committee people.

May Garden Guide

from Portage County Master Gardeners Volunteers

- Set Easter lilies in garden.
- Plant cool-weather crops: lettuce, spinach, chard, parsnip, onion sets, beets, carrots, kohlrabi, mustard, turnips, radishes, peas, parsley, and potatoes in early May. Soil temperatures should be at least 45 degrees.
- Plant snap beans, pole beans, sweet corn, and onion plants in mid-May. Sweet corn planted earlier in the season has fewer pest problems.
- Inspect for Iris borer larva on iris leaves. Crush larva.
- For bigger Peony flowers, de-bud several branches. Stake before buds open.
- Set out pansy plants when ground is workable.
- Dig and divide mid summer and fall blooming perennials before tip growth gets too tall.
- Plant tuberous begonias.
- Watch birch leaves for birch leaf miner infestation. Use sticky traps to monitor emergence
 of adults to help time spraying with summer oil, Neem extract, or rotenone. Sprays are
 only effective on adults or larvae before they tunnel into leaves. Some soil applied
 systemic chemicals may be effective in controlling larvae after they have tunneled into
 leaves.
- Plant tomato seedlings by pinching off lower leaves and placing on its side in a shallow furrow 2.5 inches below the soil surface. Soil closer to the surface is warmer and will speed tomato growth.
- Plant and transplant new evergreens before new growth appears.
- Plant strawberries, bush fruits, and grapes in mid month. Pinch blossoms from newly planted strawberries to develop strong plants for next year.
- Remove faded flowers from spring-flowering bulbs.
 Cut off stalks but allow leaves to die down naturally.
 Fertilize after blooming with 5 10-20.
- Plant stored geraniums in well-drained soil after last frost and keep moist. New growth should begin in one week.
- Prune spring-flowering shrubs after flowers have faded. Apply fertilizer.
- Toward end of the month, harden off seedlings of vegetable transplants and annuals grown indoors.
 Bring in at night or place in cold frames before planting in garden.



What is Standard IV?

If you have been on the WCMGV website lately nosing around you may have come across Standard IV. You might be wondering why we have four standards when we used to have only three. Well, here is the answer! In the past year or so, we have been trying to establish a procedure for handling the many requests we get for help with garden projects and/or education. Also, as part of the shift in emphasis from maintaining in-ground gardens to promoting horticultural education, Standard IV was developed to define a process for doing that.

In addition to the Standard IV document, there are two other new forms for use with the standard. The first one is the *Community Education Request* form. Persons/groups who want our assistance will be referred to this form on the website. It has two parts: the first one is for a speaker or program, and the second is for developing an educational project.

Once the form is filled in and sent to the Extension Office, it begins the process outlined in Standard IV. If the request is for something other than a speaker/program, the second new form called *Checklist for Master Gardener Community Education Project Approval* is used to help the MGV(s) and the requesting party to, first, assess whether the project is realistic and attainable, and second, whether the project is within our

capabilities to assist with as MGVs.

We are hoping that this new standard will clear up many of the questions about who, what, when, where, and how we deal with requests. So, if someone asks you if the MGVs can help with ABC or XYZ, you will know to tell them to fill in the form on the website. You will also know how we will decide to deal with their request. As this is the pilot year for this standard, your feedback on this new process and standard is appreciated. This standard is also designed to promote more of an educational emphasis, rather than dig-in-the-ground projects.
