Plant Sale Information

Plant Sales.....Everyone's Chance to Contribute

Two common comments heard at checkout were: 1) The main reason shoppers attend Maple Fall Fest was to visit the master gardener's sale. 2)Many shoppers said they very much appreciate the help they receive when choosing plants. One factor for the success of our fall plant sale is because we are part of Marshfield's Maple Fall Fest which has 150+ vendor booths, breakfast tent, kids' zone and entertainment. Matt McLean estimated the attendance was 10,000 over the two days. They and us bring in a lot of buyers. Many times, Deb was told at the checkout that the primary factor is the abundance of plants due to the many hours Donna Streiff and Joyce Fischer put in on care of the plants, especially the repotting. Plus, both worked all day Friday – Sunday without a break; as well as Bea Kohl and myself. Eleven current members and two previous members rounded out the crew. Judy Miller, Micky Erickson, Joy Mader, Famia Marx, Ann Rozner, Catherine Gruen, Deb Rokke, Diane & Jim Nickels, Peg Harvey, Carol Tomke, Barb Herreid, and Carolyn Schulein. THANK YOU for your volunteerism and dedication.

When I compared the photos of 2021 to 2022 there was a noticeable lack of house-plants this year. 2021 had houseplants on the ground and 3+ tables, 2022 was only one-quarter of a table. These were an important contribution to 2021. This year the larger succulents in display containers sold out within two hours! All members please think about growing more of these for next fall. Starting new plants by propagation will take some time and the committee is urging you to start by watching Melinda Myers' webinar on Boosting the Beauty of and Propagating Houseplants on Nov. 2 live, or afterward on demand. (See the educational opportunities for more info.)

The other shortage was in dried arrangements. An interesting customer comment by two ladies: they told us they drove from Stevens Point just to get our dry arrangements!!. We need to take advantage of this. What we need is plants with distinct dried seed heads, and hydrangeas blooms. We completely sold out by 2pm on Sunday. With only 6 workers on Sunday, we could hardly help each other out let alone go harvest more dry arrangement materials. Right now, is a good time to harvest plants and/or their seeds. Also, throughout the year you can identify where plants are to cut when they are ready. Also think about planting more plants that make good dried seed heads.

The majority of plants for the sale have been grown by only 2 or 3 members. We need more members to grow plants from seed, or we will have to choose another idea for fundraising. We can't continue to rely on 1 pr 2 people to do all the growing. If you need help getting started this winter, watch the Winter Sowing video on the Wood County MG website in the Members Only section or talk to Donna Streiff If you need seeds, order from Prairie Moon Nursery. Choose plants that would be useful in your garden and keep a few for your use while growing others for the sale. Or if you want to take a jug of seedlings to transplant and tend for the summer, talk to Donna also. Remember that we **cannot sell plants dug from our our gardens** because of possible jumping worm transfers. Only plants raised from slips or seeds in commercial potting soil may be sold.

In spite of the shortages we did have a successful sale. The amount of donations we received doubled this year. As of 29 September, our profits were \$2,483.97. Adding that to the spring sale profits of \$1,548.00 equals many support and service opportunities.

Central WI State Fair Report

Every year in late August during the Central WI State Fair the Wood County Master Gardeners staff a booth. We set up educational displays and provide handouts about gardening issues and the master gardeners. Twelve members volunteered to answer inquires put forth to them by fairgoers. This year we added Karlene's potted plants and plant samples of common plant diseases and pest destruction.

A twist to the week was the handing-off of the one free parking pass the fair provides us. Bea Kohl started out with it and gave it to Micky Erickson to give to Lynn Bushmaker. October Garden Guide

Taken from Portage County Master Gardener website.

- On October 1, start treatment of poinsettias for bract coloration. Place in total darkness for 15 hours every day for 2 months. Night temperature should be 65-70 degrees F. Keep soil moist.
- Plant peonies until October 15. Mulch after ground freezes.
- Seed perennials such as Oriental poppy, Iceland poppy, gas plant, primrose, scabiosa, phlox, pansy and penstemon. Mark where planted.
- Plant spring flowering bulbs. Bulbs can be planted up to six weeks after first fall frost. Fertilize existing bulb beds with bone meal, milorganite, or 5-5-5 fertilizer.
- Harvest gladiolas at least six weeks after bloom and before ground freezes. Cure for three days at 80 degrees before storing. Label and store at 40-45 degrees in open trays.
- Remove iris leaves to prevent over wintering of iris borer eggs. Cut leaves to four-inch fans.
- Store tuberose at 45 degrees F, tuberous rooted begonias at 45-50 degrees, and caladium at 60 degrees.
- After killing frost, rose bush foliage should be stripped and old leaves cleaned from bed. Shortly before ground freezes, roses should be given good deep soaking. Prune branches enough to prevent whipping around in wind or to fit under rose cones.
- Sow seeds of hardy annuals: cleome, pinks, candytuft, larkspur, bachelor buttons and calendula. Mark where planted.
- Plant Jerusalem artichoke during last two weeks of month.
- Prepare vegetable garden soil for early spring planting. Remove old stalks to prevent insect and disease problems next year. Spread manure, incorporate into soil.
- Rejuvenate rhubarb by dividing into quarters and replanting.
- Cut back asparagus ferns and dispose to prevent insect and disease problems next year. Incorporate manure into soil and mulch with straw.
- Use mulch around Brussels sprouts to moderate soil temperature and prolong harvest.
- Water plants well for more cold tolerance.
- Plant garlic 2-3 inches deep and cover with 4-6 inches of straw mulch.
- Rake, chop and compost any fallen leaves from lawn.
- Fertilize shade trees when leaf color changes and leaves drop.
- Plant dormant deciduous trees and shrubs from now until ground freezes. A two-inch layer of mulch reduces freezing and thawing, which can damage roots.
- If fertilizing lawn one time a year, apply it in the third week of October. If fertilizing twice a year, apply in October and early June. If three times a year, include a September application.
- Water evergreens and foundation plantings before ground freezes.
- Protect woody ornamentals and fruit trees against mice.
